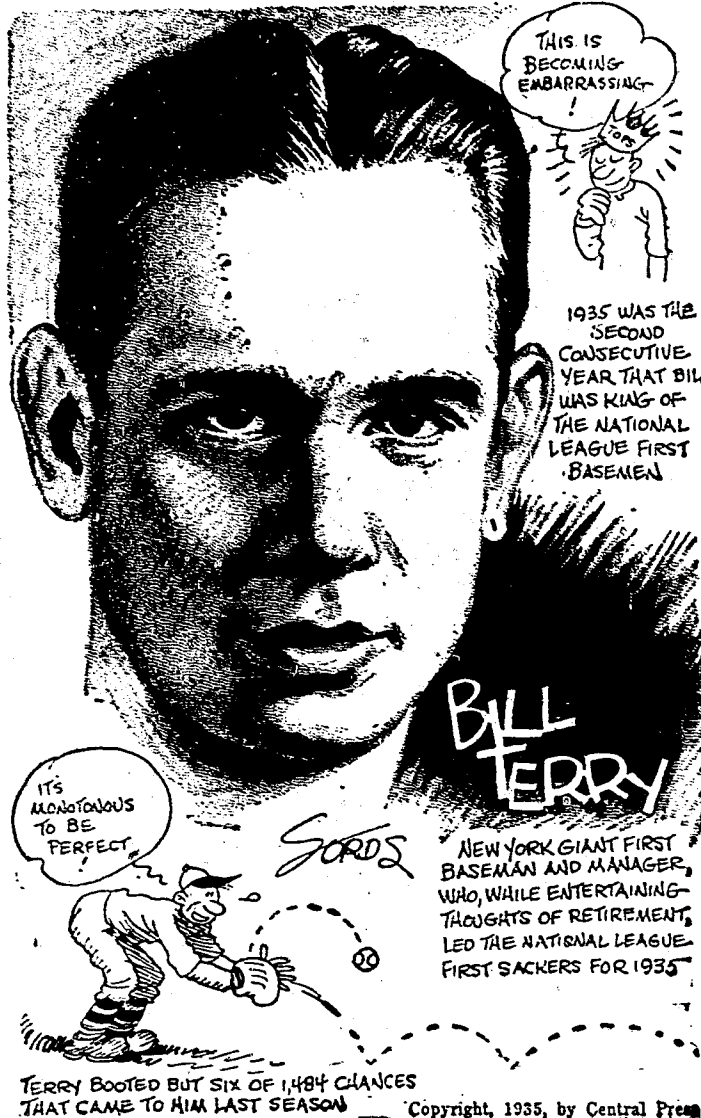
COLEMAN AND BLAIRMORE CHALK UP WINS

Maple Leafs Play 'Hat Tonight

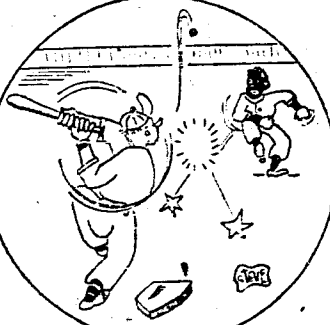

Dave "Sweeney" Schriner, the last year rookie sensation with New York Americans and still placed among the most dangerous forwards in the N.H.L., was passed up a few years ago because he was thought "dumb". Art Ross, Boston's mastermind, personally scouted the Canadian and couldn't see him. Actually Schriner looks dumb—except to an opposing goalie. Perhaps it's his somewhat expressionless appearance for he certainly has proved he has hockey brains aplenty.

Summertime he plays baseball. When Red Dutton, now his hockey manager, handled a pro. baseball team made up of hockey players, Schriner was among them. He faced "Chucker" Beverly, crack hurler of the Colored Giants in Calgary, one day. "Chucker" had mowed Dutton's pucksters down in order for eight innings. Two men were out in the ninth and the pitching ace had a no-run, no-hit game in the bag when Sweeney came to bat. The count was three and two; the colored pitcher threw in a low, wide curve. Schriner smashed it out of the park for a home-run to abruptly shatter the Beverly dream.

The star-spangled ace got his nickname from schoolmates who couldn't pronounce his German surname. He had as his youthful idols Duke Keats, Eddie Shore and Harry Oliver. In addition to hockey he starred at school as a track and field man, football and baseball player. Now he is also a high class golfer.

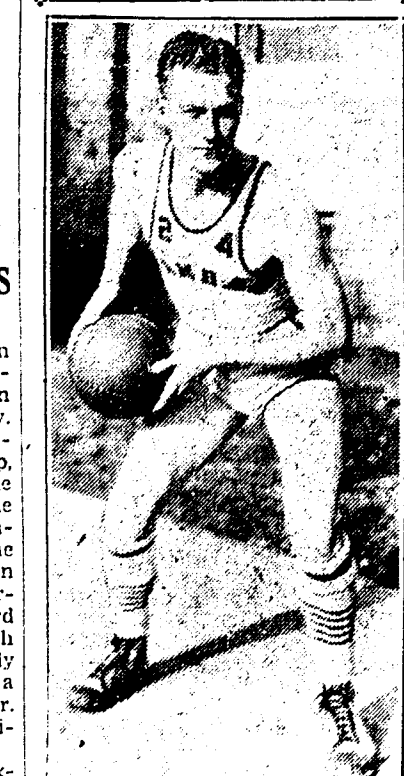

COLEMAN, Jan. 9.—Coleman Canadians continued their winning ways in one of their easiest victories to date when they romped home over the luckless Medicine Hat Monarchs 8-1 in a league game here Wednesday night. Play was the most listless seen here for some time. The 'Hat team freely admitted that they did not want an enormous score chalked against them and were quite content to slacken the pace whenever possible.

Only in the third period did the Canadians show any ambition and credited the net behind Reburn five times to add to the three goals scored in the two opening frames. As the score steadily mounted, the 'Hat opened up and gave Scodellaro some work to do, Craven robbing Scodellaro of his fourth successive shutout with only six minutes to go in the final frame.
