NEW L.B.W. RULE MAY BE USED IN ALL 1936 CRICKET

LONDON, Jan. 9.—(C.P.) — Believing the new leg-before-wicket rule, tried in English first-class and minor counties cricket last season, was a success, the advisory county committee of the M.C.C. recommends its adoption in all cricket during the 1936 season.

Players and umpires generally have approved the experiment which aimed to speed up the game. It is said the alteration has improved the game, forced batsmen to make more strokes, given greater encouragement to bowlers and led to a larger number of games being finished.

The amended leg-before-wicket rule reads: "The striker is out l.b.w. if with any part of his person (except the hand), which is between wicket and wicket, he intercepts a ball which in the opinion of the umpire at the bowler's wicket, shall have been pitched in a straight line from the bowler's wicket to the striker's wicket or shall have been pitched on the off-side of the striker's wicket and would have hit it."
